STUDY HISTORY OR THE WORLD'S A MYSTERY

the big \$ issue redux

News of **21 Grand** resuming shows overlapped with the arrival of two editions of *Freeway* surfacing, particularly Volume 3 Number 1 (Winter 1994): *The Big \$ Issue*. The editor's note, 15 years old and fresh as today's headlines, laments a chronic lack of resources, the disappearance of venues, and the heroic work of individuals to support a vibrant, creative community. Opening the time capsule to discover these familiar themes was a cold comfort.

Anyone not remembering, or even ever knowing about, *Freeway* (or 21 Grand) is forgiven. The millennial mind is more about retrieval than storage, and with a business model that rapidly cycles critical success with commercial failure every four years or so, it's likely that whatever was ailing Bay Area new music in 1994 is ailing us today, burning bright and hot in 140 characters or less via Twitter. And inasmuch as the scene is a triumph of individualism, there's no evidence of ongoing interest in institutional memory, however valuable or maddening it might be.

But for those down for the clown, or seeking solace or strategy as we continue to witness and endure the challenges of making art in an era of economic collapse, the *Transbay* will do its part to increase the accessibility of collective experience.

Freeway. Steppin' Out.

Publishing quarterly from 1990 to 1994, *Freeway* is the print precursor to the *Transbay Calendar*, and an extension of **The Improvised Music Association**. It published performance and recording reviews, interviews, letters to the editor, calendar listings and, fabulously, classified ads ("You can become a flute! Or a guitar or even a saxophone. Creative lessons by Hillary (510) 848-3306").

With a number of contributors, *Freeway* maintained a journalistic tone in each issue: praising and excoriating work as it saw fit and lifting the issues of the day ("Why Do Americans Hate Art?" by Tom Djll and "Children Are Natural Improvisers (It's Obvious)" by Randy Porter). It also transparently recorded community support and criticism of its own enterprise. Each issue civilly stated the discord among the editorial collective, and invited readers to attend their public meetings. *Freeway* produced compilation tapes, sure to be a valuable

rarity today, The later issues also flogged for donations.

And those, according to Dan Plonsey, never materialized at the level required. The journal moved from a free to a subscription publication and closed in early 1995. •


